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Oswald, Named Killer of President, Meets Death by Assassin's Bullet



Nightclub Owner Evades Police to Fire Fatal Shot

DALLAS (AP)—Lee Harvey Oswald found merciful death lurking in a crowd Sunday, just as President John F. Kennedy did 43 hours earlier. The accused presidential assassin was shot and killed during a routine jail transfer.

Jack Robertson, alias Ruby, 32, barkeeper owner of a downtown Dallas city room joint, knowing since Kennedy's untimely death, stepped down from the ranks of some 200 mobsters and wordily sent a single pistol bullet into Oswald's left side before the chest.

A mobster cheer went up from some of the spectators as the 24-year-old Oswald, a self-proclaimed Communist, crouched on Oswald's feet, within a cordon of escorting police officers.

"It's too good for him," mumbled one man's voice above the ensuing tumult.

Oswald was out down at 11:29 a.m. (CST) while being taken from City Hall detention quarters to a permanent execution room cell in the Dallas County jail, there to await trial for Kennedy's assassination. An armored car was standing by for the transfer.

It was 1:07 p.m. when Oswald officially was pronounced dead. In the same hospital where Kennedy expired Friday, with the same hectic medical activity swirling around him, with some of the same doctors working over him who labored vainly to save the President's life.

"Why did you do it?" someone shouted at Ruby, who was charged with murder. His expression betrayed no flicker of emotion as he ignored the question.

His sister, Mrs. Eva Green, said he had talked incessantly of the Kennedy assassination, grieving more than she did for his own death before. The sister said the last president Oswald would never go to trial, that the Commission would kill him first.

The impact of the shooting was doubly felt by thousands of Americans who saw it on their television screens. Journalists worldwide had their cameras rolling as Oswald was taken to the Texas State Penitentiary.

President Laid in State Beneath Capitol's Dome

WASHINGTON — The body of President John F. Kennedy was laid in state under the towering dome of the Capitol Sunday. It was a quiet, simple ceremony which came to a hushed conclusion when the widow, Jacqueline Kennedy, her face a mask of shock and grief, brought a small bouquet of flowers to the casket of her husband, who had been shot and killed in the White House to the White House to the Capitol to be in state.

The alleged assassin's death was an historic footnote to two days of high drama—beginning about noon Friday when the slaying crack of a sniper's bullet cut down the 35-year-old Kennedy as he rode through a Dallas crowd toward a motorcade. A Dallas police officer shot Ruby along the route.

The same assassin wounded Gov. John Connally of Texas, who was in the motorcade with Kennedy. Police said they were convinced the killer was Oswald, and that during an attempted getaway he also shot and killed a Dallas policeman, J. D. Tippit.

Kennedy dropped unconscious into the arms of his wife, Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, and died 29 minutes later in Parkland Hospital.

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Police Chief Lists Oswald Case Evidence

DALLAS — Police Chief Jesse Curry Sunday listed evidence to back up his contention that Dallas police had "a concrete case" proving Lee Harvey Oswald was the assassin of President Kennedy.

The evidence, he said, includes a clear photograph showing Oswald holding a rifle of the same type used in the assassination. It was a 4.5 mm bolt-action model of Italian make with a 14.5-inch sight.

The chief said this proof that Oswald possessed a rifle of the same type as the one that fired the fatal shot was the most conclusive element of the evidence.

District Atty. Henry Wade said he would not release the physical evidence.

Backing up the photograph, Curry said, is a written report on Oswald's handwriting to a Chicago mail order house for a rifle costing \$127.88. He said the FBI man in checking the serial number in the rifle used in the assassination with that of the mail order weapon.

A second vital link in the chain of evidence linking Oswald to the assassination, Curry said, is testimony from witnesses that Oswald was in the Texas book depository — from where the shot was fired — the time the President was assassinated.

Prior to Oswald's death, authorities said there was certain strong evidence which was not going to be released at the time. Wade declined to divulge this evidence even after the alleged assassin died in Parkland Hospital.

The photographic evidence cited by Curry was found in the Irving, Texas, residence of Oswald's father-in-law, who said Curry said the picture showed Oswald in "a high and low were 20 and 18."

Snow Flurries Expected

There was a flourish of bugles, and the band struck up "Hail to the Chief" but not to the quick tempo that Mrs. Kennedy enjoyed. This time, the dramatic presidential salute came at a moment of a deep, when it ended, it was quiet again, the line of the 21-gun salute echoed in the hall.

Three points entered and stood to the left of the entry way, followed by the flag and a color guard. Then, standing under the weight of the heavy rifle, eight servicemen, from all branches, entered, circled the great casket, which bore the coffin and body of Abraham Lincoln 120 years before, and in a plow. They stood at attention and fired one step back, turned and fired out.

Mrs. Kennedy, clad in black, her head covered by a black hat, entered behind the casket, holding Caroline by the hand and escorted by Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy. She was followed by her husband Peter Lawford, Robert Kennedy and the widow stood in front of the rest of the President's family, their eyes on the coffin.

Young John Kennedy, who will be three today, walked up the steps.
